## Toilets for Kileo Children

Friends of Tanzania was pleased to receive news from the Community Health Department of the Kilimanjaro Christian Medical Centre (KCMC) that the Kileo Ward Primary School Latrine Construction project in Handeni District is close to completion.

We provided \$2,520 to the medical center for construction materials for latrines to be used by the 365 students of Kivuluni Primary School and the 331 students of the adjacent Mkombozi Primary School. KCMC, in partnership with the Kileo Dispensary, is working to decrease the incidence of diarrheal diseases in the region. After building the latrines, they will follow up with public health training.

The completion of the project is vital to comply with the new Tanzanian law requiring all primary schools to have functioning latrines or the schools will be closed. Construction of the 16 latrines, housed in two separate buildings, began in February 2009. It was anticipated that the project could be soon completed with the help of the entire village.

However, there were delays due to various factors, including the crumbling of the initial

foundation and difficulty obtaining cement. In addition, current drought conditions prevented villagers — mostly subsistence farmers — from volunteering their labor as soon as hoped. Members of the Community Health Department of KCMC, under the coordination of Dr. Sabina Mtwewe, have made many visits to the site to confirm that construction was proceeding adequately, to provide funds for materials, and to help troubleshoot any problems.

Noreen Mucha of FOT has been involved with this project, and another FOT member, Diane Russell, visited the site in September 2009 and spoke with Dr. Mtwewe and the headmaster of one of the primary schools. According to a recent progress report, the pit latrines and surrounding walls are built, and one building has a tin roof and doors. Still to come are finishing the floors, putting on the roof and doors to the second building, and painting the latrines.

The success of the project can be readily seen by comparing the photos of what was formerly used as a latrine with the new construction. FOT is proud to have donated to this important change for the hygiene and health of the primary school students of Kileo.

One example of a Giving Back project currently under discussion is an educators workshop in Moshi. FOT Board Member, Diane Russell is working closely with Second Chance Education Centre, a Tanzanian NGO, to hold a weeklong capacity-building workshop in July or October for rural primary and secondary teachers in the Moshi area. The participating Tanzanian teachers will be expected to expand the reach of the workshop by demonstrating new teaching techniques to their colleagues back in their rural schools.

Diane is gathering contributions along with her own donation to fund the costs of room and board for the rural teachers and for teaching materials and handouts. The workshop will bring together visiting international teachers (who will cover their own expenses) and local teachers and headmasters to discuss, demonstrate, and develop modern teaching methodology. # FOT Projects Committee Report

Since reporting to our members in October, we have agreed to fund an additional 5 projects for a total of \$11,500 and two Giving Back projects for \$15,150 for a grand total of \$26,650. FOT was pleased during this time to have gifts given in honor of Nice Macha, a Tanzanian who has worked with several NGO's in the Lushoto area; in honor of Cece Wasserman; and in appreciation of Candy Warner's service to FOT.

Thanks goes out to the Friends of Tanzania members who have volunteered during recent travels in Tanzania to visit FOT-funded organizations and view first-hand the results of our mutual collaborations.

From the visiting FOT members, the projects committee has received a number of on-the-scene accounts of the progress of various projects. The members' descriptions of the warm welcomes they received and their reports of how FOT funds are assisting Tanzanian organizations ease the day-to-day lives of people upholds my conviction in the merit of FOT's modest grant program.

Please continue to let me know if you are planning to travel to Tanzania and are able to spend a day or two visiting one of FOT's sponsored project sites. ## FOT Projects Funded from October 2009 – March 2010

- **\$1500 for Micro Loan Project, Kigoma Region, Kigoma.**  
*TWSEDHRO (Tanzania Women Social Economic Development and Human Rights Organization):*

to expand to Kigoma the successful micro loan program they began in Kasulu District in November, 2007. In Kigoma, during the first year of the project, 5 groups of 4 women each will be granted small loans to run businesses such as selling fish or farm products. As the loans are repaid with interest, future groups of women will receive micro loans.

- **\$3000 for Reforestation/Tree Nursery Project, Rukwa Region, Sumbawanga.**  
*KAESO (Kaengesa Environmental Conservation Society):*

for tree seedlings and equipment for a village tree planting project. The community will actively participate in planting the seedlings, building protective fences, and assuring watering. The entire population of approximately 25,000 in the surrounding area will be direct beneficiaries.

- **\$1000 for Vocational Education Project, Ruvuma Region, Songea.**

*African Benedictine Hanga Abbey:* to purchase plumbing tools to use for training purposes and income generation. The Abbey plumbers, who are monks, also work as plumbers in the community and use the money they make to support the vocational training department which is open to students of all faiths. An FOT member visited the Abbey and sent a favorable report.

- **\$3000 for Reforestation/Tree Nursery Project, Iringa Region, Njombe.**  
*NJOWECA*

*(Njombe West Environmental Conservation Association):*

for tree seedlings and materials for their tree nursery. FOT funded NJOWECA in 2007 and 2008. They were nominated for the Equator Prize in 2006 by the United Nations Developmental Programme and are part of the United Nations Environmental Programme. A recommendation was received from a FOT member to continue funding for this final, third year.

- **\$3000 for Water Project, Ruvuma Region, Songea.**  
*COCOTO Community Consulting and Training Organization:*

for 12 hand pumps and cement for 12 drilled boreholes. The project is a continuation of the boreholes and horticulture project that FOT helped fund in 2008. The current phase of the project will provide the villages of Gumbilo and Mtwangimbole with a safe source of water for use by local

families and also for farmland irrigation. Approximately 8,500 people in the two villages will benefit from the project.

### Current Giving Back Projects:

- **\$10,150 to Geita Girls' Secondary School Scholarship Program, Geita, Mwanza Region.**

FOT Member Barbara Torrey has provided scholarships for 6 years to girls in need to complete their secondary school education. In 2010, 26 girls will be able to continue their education in this program.

- **\$5000 to Lutengano Secondary School Girls' Scholarship Program, Tukuyu, Mbeya Region.**

FOT member, Anita Johnson has provided scholarships to girls in need in Tukuyu. Now in its third year, this program allows 10 girls who have achieved good grades and citizenship activities, the opportunity to continue their education.

**TETEA**

Charles, Victoria, Brian, Keegan and two other RPCV's founded Tanzanian Empowerment Through Education Association (TETEA) in 2008. All of the founders had served as teachers in southern Tanzania, either in the Mt-wara or Songea areas, between 2004 and 2007. TETEA provides scholarships for at least 20 students from the Songea area to go to secondary school. It is also in the midst of raising funds for a library project in Maguu, south of Songea, which is designed to provide learning materials for a number of secondary and primary schools in that area. Clare started this group to collect used sewing machines, both manual and electric, for distribution in Tanzania. She has shipped over 100 machines to Tanzania, including to vocational training centers in Dar es Salaam, Kigoma, Kasulu, Kakonko and Manyoni. Funds are also provided for local maintenance of the sewing machines. Sara was an upper primary teacher with the Peace Corps in Mbeya 1963-65. She visited the school and along with others raised \$80,000 so that adequate housing could be provided for 40 girls receiving CHES scholarships for secondary schools in the area.

## Tanzanian Networking

### • COLORADO •

Since moving to Boulder, CO, a few years ago, my husband, Craig Hafner, and I have met people here who are Tanzanian or have connections to Tanzania. Some belong to groups working in Tanzania which have goals similar to Friends of Tanzania.

Recently FOT hosted a networking event in Denver which brought together 24 people, three of whom were FOT members. Representatives of eight organizations, including FOT, gave brief presentations about their work and provided handouts and contact information. These organizations assist programs in home-based care, schools and education, support of orphans and vulnerable children in Tanzania, and student exchange programs. There were questions and discussion of ideas, sharing of experiences, contacts and resources, and a general enjoyment in being together with others involved in Tanzania.

Results of the event include setting up a blog to communicate between the organizations, holding periodic meetings, planning an event in Colorado in honor of the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Tanzania's Independence next year, and a few more FOT members.

## TANZANIA IN THE NEWS

- In November 2009, Tanzania authorities collaborated with officers from police, national wildlife, customs and national intelligence agencies across East Africa in "Operation Costa," which targeted wildlife crime. More than two tons of ivory was seized and more than 100 people arrested in the operation, which was coordinated by Interpol. Operation Costa was named in honor of Constantius "Costa" Aloysius Mlay, a former director of the wildlife division of the Tanzania Ministry of Natural Resources and Tourism. (*Interpol*)
- In March, President Jakaya Kikwete announced a new Tanzanian election law that will impose tighter controls on campaign financing and improve the standards of this year's polls. President Kikwete said the new measures were crucial to ensuring the credibility of the legislative and presidential elections to be held in October. (*Daily News, Tanzania*)
- In May, Tanzania will host the 20th World Economic Forum on Africa, held for the first time in East Africa. This year's theme is "Rethinking Africa's Growth Strategy." In addition, the Forum's Young Global Leaders Summit will be held concurrently in Dar es Salaam and will integrate more than 200 of the world's top young leaders in the meeting. (*World Economic Forum*)

### ROBERT GRIFFITH

A longtime member of Friends of Tanzania, Bob Griffith, died Nov. 21, 2009, at the age of 66. As a Peace Corps Volunteer, Bob taught at Makiungu School in Singida Region for four years in the mid 1960s. After returning to the United States, he taught a few more years before beginning a 35-year career with the U.S. government's Defense Contract Management Agency.

Bob loved Notre Dame, everything "Irish," and his garden. He was well-loved by family and

friends for his service to his church and his community, and for his passion for the Peace Corps. This was expressed not only through FOT but also through his leadership positions in the returned volunteer groups in Southeastern Ohio (SORVO) and in Cincinnati (CARV). Members of both groups have raised \$3,250 to fund a project in Bob's memory in the Singida area. FOT member Barbara Mackey and Bob's nephew will visit Singida this summer to find a suitable project. Further contributions to FOT in Bob's memory are welcome.
